This year we walk into the season of Lent on the first day of March, Ash Wednesday. As Baptists we don't usually follow the traditions and rituals of many of our colleagues in other denominations. We don't always observe those times of repentance and fasting or sacrificing something that is important in our lives for that period of 40 days (excluding Sundays) from Ash Wednesday to Easter. As a rule, we don't ask one another, "What did you give up for Lent?" This year let me invite you to make a decision on something that you can embrace. Embrace hunger! Embrace it not in the act of fasting, but instead learn about the issues that surround hunger in our community and our world. Learn the causes of hunger in society and explore the solutions. How is it that we can participate by identifying the problems and uncovering answers? As we embrace this the plight of others becomes a primary concern and our own difficulties become secondary. The needs of others become our focus. We can choose to move through Lent from a place of wonder and gratitude - wondering where God might show up in special ways in our lives and what God might reveal to us during this time as we embrace an issue of vital importance. This can be a time of gratitude for how God will direct us to see the new life available to all through the resurrection.

Oh yes, we will hear again about the betrayal, the denial, the pain and death, but Lent reminds us that in the midst of these sobering truths of our humanity, resurrection is the greater truth. *Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.* Matthew 5.6

During this season we do think of the passion of Christ and we may be reminded of all the movies, plays and productions we have seen depicting those last days of the life of Jesus and His resurrection. An opportunity is available for us to be a part of history three years from now. What are you doing in 2020?

In the town of Oberammergau, in the Bavarian Alps of Germany the Passion Play is presented every 10 years. It was in 1633 that the town was suffering from the Bubonic Plague. The villagers appealed for Divine intervention to save their families. They vowed that if God would spare them, they would perform a Passion Play every ten years. They say there was not a single victim to the Plague after that. Keeping their promise, the people of the town performed the first play in 1634 and have continued to do so through the centuries. Many of Oberammergau's residents still take part in this powerful work of art featuring dramatic performances, beautiful music and choral accompaniment. A reputable travel company has shared with me some tour opportunities that are available that would include the event in Oberammergau. Let me know if you would be interested and we can plan together for a special time in 2020.

Deacon's Bench

This came from a book of Devotions titled BEST PASSAGES OF THE BIBLE. The writer of this one is Donald W. Sandmann

Gentle Justice-----Isaiah 42:1-8

If a reporter were to stand outside your Church after worship next Sunday and ask people, "What did Jesus do?" she would receive fairly consistent answers. "Jesus is the Savior" "Jesus saves us from our sins." These are very good answers, but they have become so common that the words Save and Savior are almost embarrassing clichés, like the "JESUS SAVES " in blinking neon lights above some churches.

Perhaps Isaiah can put other material on the frame of our definition of "savior or "messiah". The first word people of his day would associate with the Messiah was Justice. Here the prophet describes the Messiah three times as the one who brings forth or establishes justice. But in contrast to what we associate with justice ----- "lock up all the criminals" -- ---the picture Isaiah paints is one of gentle justice.

A bruised reed He will not break, and a smoldering wick He will not snuff out. Too often in history, justice has been a steamroller used by the powerful to crush the poor and the weak. But God's Anointed One doesn't crush others to make Himself look good. He doesn't need to, for He is already holy. He can use His power to fan gently the faltering flame that is our faith. He can love us into being pursuers of justice not for ourselves, but for those who are even weaker than we.

Jesus, justice-bringer and loving friend, fill us with Your Holy Spirit so that we might care for others with Your gentle justice.

'Rebuilding, Restoring, Renewing...Baton Rouge,' La.

In August 2016, Baton Rouge received over 2 feet of rain within hours—an onslaught that resulted in severe flooding throughout the city and surrounding communities. According to news reports, damage estimates exceeded \$9 billion, and more than 150,000 properties were damaged with thousands of families displaced. Among those who remain displaced and struggling to rebuild are more than 80 American Baptist families. A joint effort of American Baptist Home Mission Societies (ABHMS) and American Baptist Churches of the South, **"Rebuilding, Restoring, Renewing...Baton Rouge" will host several work weeks throughout 2017**. Delivering comfort, one stitch at a time Reprinted from the Delaware State News.

DOVER — Glenda Case knows firsthand the spiritual comfort that the warmth of a shawl or a blanket can provide.

She remembers the morning her mother passed away in a hospital near Greensboro, North Carolina, and when her mom's nurse brought in a shawl and laid it across her mom in a time of need and said a prayer.

"It was just very, very meaningful and touching to me," Ms. Case said. "Then after (my mother) passed that day I just took the shawl with me and took it home and placed it on my blanket stand.

"Now, I just think of her constantly when I see it."

That experience moved Ms. Case so much that she founded the First Baptist Church of Dover Comfort Shawls group last June with five members. It has now grown to 13 members, including one man.

The group makes handmade shawls and blankets and delivers them to staff at Bayhealth Kent General Hospital in Dover to give to cancer patients and others, as well as friends and church members. They meet once a month at First Baptist Church of Dover at 301 Walker Road, mostly to provide each other with some camaraderie and friendly discussion. The group, whose members range in age from 60- to 92-years-old, has been able

to exceed Ms. Case's expectations when it comes to creating the various fleece, knit and crocheted shawls.

"We have a cancer patient in our group and she said that when she gets chemo, her and the cancer patients who get chemotherapy treatments are always cold and they want a blanket," she said.

"So that's how we got the idea to check with the hospital and see if there was a need."

There definitely was.

Since June, they have delivered more than 100 of their handmade shawls to patients at Kent General which are theirs to keep.



Debbie Beaver, of Dover, is that cancer patient who made the suggestion for the group to call the hospital's oncology department. She has been fighting breast cancer for 14 years and it has recently spread into her spine and legs.

She has been a proud member of the group almost since its inception and is currently working on a blanket for a man with a "heavy, interesting stitch" that a man would enjoy.

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These are just some of the homemade shawls and blankets that have been handcrafted by First Baptist Church of Dover's Comfort Shawls group.

Ms. Beaver said most of the shawls and blankets seem to be designed for women, so she's trying to change that a little.

"Just making them for people is the best part," Ms. Beaver said. "I haven't actually needed one yet, but I figure if I ask for one someone will certainly give me one.

"We work on the shawls and blankets at home a lot but we meet once a month for fun and encouragement, plus this is a lot of our social lives. I love this. I think this is an amazing idea."



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More than just shawls

The cozy shawl comforters are more than just warmth providers, according to Ms. Case.

"We do a lot of these at (Kent General) hospital and the others we deliver to friends and church members and people that need a warm hug and need to be comforted, that's really what they're for," she said. Ms. Case said that each shawl or blanket has a tag attached that says, "Made

Today, more than ever, the world needs godly men; men who will step up and courageously lead at home, at church, at work, and in their communities. That's the message of **Stepping Up.**



American Baptist Women's Ministries of First Baptist Church of Dover 2016 Annual Report

This calendar year began with the taking down of our Chrismon Trees in January, always a bittersweet event after a busy holiday season. The Circles also continued their individual meetings and programs. The ABWM Board also met to discuss the upcoming Annual Retreat in February.

Our February Retreat was a grand success with over 40 women from both FBC of Dover and Christ Memorial attending. The entire retreat was based on our mission area of Hungary. Carmella Jones, missionary to Hungary, was our guest speaker and gave a very informative as well as inspirational message about Hungary. Soup, salad, Hungarian goulash, and apple cake were served for lunch. The ladies enjoyed making a placemat with a Hungarian design in it for craft time. We also kicked off our annual fund raiser, making and selling Easter Eggs.

March found our ladies busily making over 850 Easter Eggs. We gathered for 8 sessions of making eggs. These sessions are a wonderful chance to meet women from other circles and to fellowship together as we bond for a common cause.

In April, we tallied our egg sales to find we were able to send \$1,505.25 to our regional project, Clean Water Project in Nicaragua. Many, many thanks go to all the people who not only sold eggs but to those faithful who helped make them as well. The ABWM Board also met this month to plan the Annual Dinner and Installation of Officers for May. The individual circles continued to meet as well.

Many times our ladies hear of a cause that interests them. One such ministry is the Shawl Ministry which makes shawls, both knitted and crocheted as well as sewn, to give to our local cancer center to warm the chemo patients as they receive treatment. They also distribute them to church members who've been hospitalized, shut-ins, friends, and family of FBC. The ministry has grown to include over a dozen women from all circles who meet now once a month to collect finished shawls and to work on more for the next month. To date they've made and distributed over 100 shawls.

Our big event in May is our Annual Dinner Meeting. It was themed around "Road Signs" and centered on Human Sex Trafficking in Delaware. Our speaker was Amy Day from "Meet Me at the Well". Her talk was inspiring and very emotional. Her passion for this mission was overwhelming. A free will offering was taken to help her organization and netted over \$200. Sue Moore installed our officers with a Road Sign theme as well. Of course, all the ladies enjoyed each other's covered dishes!

Some of the Circles met in June to close our 2015-2016 year. The ABWM Board met to plan for the upcoming 2016-2017 year.

We all spent July and August hopefully relaxing for the summer.

September began our new year with ABWM Sunday on Sept. 18th. Margaret Steinhoff planned a wonderful service featuring Adalia Gutierrez-Lee as our speaker, who gave, not only a sermon on Cuba, but an inspiring talk about women being ministers in that part of the world. As a remembrance of the day, Sue Moore's father, Daniel Sherman, had made each woman a necklace. At each Circle meeting leaders distributed the new booklet also made by Margaret Steinhoff.

Linda Horton organized our Overland White Cross Quota and also took the articles to the Race Track Ministry in Philadelphia, PA. On Oct. 30th the women received their packet of devotionals for Baptist Women's World Day of Prayer for Nov. 7th. The women along with some help from Richard Waltz, Les Blakeman, and Harry Anthony set up and decorated the Chrismon Trees on Nov. 26th. We appreciated all the helpers who arrived that day to decorate our beautiful and meaningful trees.

In December, the Circles met to celebrate the birth of our Lord, Jesus. We met to enjoy the fellowship and joy of the season.

She said that then whoever made the shawl signs the tag and it has laundry instructions on the back. They also include a "prayer cloth" that they slip into the pocket of the shawls.



"It's just a reminder of God's love and healing powers and if they want to they can hold it in their hand, keep it in their pocket ... they can do whatever they want to with it," she said.

The First Baptist Church of Dover Comfort Shawls group usually delivers around 20 shawls and blankets to the hospital at a time and they're gone in about a week.

Ms. Case said members of the group don't interact with the patients — well, at least directly. She said that church members prayer over each of the shawls and blankets before they are delivered.

The pastor gives his blessings

Rev. Daniel L. Taylor, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dover, said the Comfort Shawls group is leading by example.

"One of the things out of scripture and even out of our American Baptist background that we've been talking about is how can we be the hands and feet of Christ," Rev. Taylor said.

"The best way that they have discovered they can do that — they can't go do long walks or demonstrations or whatever — but they can sit and they can be together and do this in their own home."

Rev. Taylor said they are answering the call for what the Bible actually says people should be doing.

"In scripture in Matthew 25, Jesus is telling the people, 'When was it you've visited me?,' and 'When was it you've given me a drink when I was thirsty?," he said.

"(The Comfort Shawls) is a part of our calling to what Jesus has asked people to do, and I think that's what it's all about."
