We step boldly into the month of June and realize that we are nearly halfway through 2022. In the past month we celebrated Mother's Day, shared a luncheon to honor women, and dedicated a beautiful 6-month-old little girl and her parents to be a family centered on Jesus. This year, the first Sunday of June is Pentecost Sunday. This marks the beginning of the church in the New Testament as the disciples had followed the directions of Jesus to wait in Jerusalem and they would receive power from the Spirit of God. The passage in Acts 2 is an exciting story of God's work in the world and in verses 41-42 we read: So those who welcomed Peter's message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added. They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. On Sunday, June 5, we too will have a baptism and we will break bread together at the Lord's Table. Plan to worship with us and wear red to celebrate and acknowledge Pentecost and the coming of the God's Spirit into our lives.



Discipleship is key to learning and growing as followers of Jesus. One of the initial ways that is done for children is through the summer tradition of Vacation Bible School. This month we have the privilege of hosting a community VBS that involves leaders and volunteers from our own church family along with those from Christ Church Episcopal, St. Andrews Lutheran and Wesley United Methodist. The theme for the week is Jerusalem Marketplace. The children will be in different small groups (tribes), will have crafts, foods, songs, games, and stories that all relate to the time of Jesus in Jerusalem. KIND

In pondering about what to write this month, turning to the children we see all around us daily provided the answer. Many questions came to mind. How will their lives change as they grow and are met with challenges with which we have never had to deal? How will they raise their children in these new times where violence is an everyday occurrence? What help can older adults give new parents? Who else can be valuable resources for these parents? Obviously, this is a topic too complex to have simple yes or no answers or brief one or two words to cover it. One could author books about the topic as well. One word did come to mind--kindness.

According to Wikipedia, kindness is defined as "a type of behavior marked by acts of generosity, consideration, or concern for others, without expecting praise or reward." In the Bible, many virtues overlap because they all have kindness as a basis. In Joshua 2:12, Rahab asks that her family be spared when she was asked to hide Joshua's spies in her home. She was showing a kindness in protecting them. God repaid her by granting her wish. In I Kings 3:6, Solomon thanks God for His kindness in giving David a son and putting his father on the throne. He continues his praise of the Lord to including him on the throne after David. In many instances, God's mercy is another name for kindness. Love is also another term for kindness. Giving His only son to die on the cross was God's greatest kindness to man.

Our children also provided their definitions of kindness. In fact, they could probably speak on the topic better than most adults. One child said kindness is helping a family member or friend out. Another one claimed kindness is being kind to others and you care about them. You share with people and play with them by sharing your toys was another answer. Lastly, kindness is teaching someone to do something. They got so involved in their discussion, a slight argument occurred. Stopping the children, it was pointed out that arguing could most times be considered an unkindness because they weren't being kind about someone else's ideas. It took a few moments for them to think about that. They realized they were wrong eventually but not until they had a few more disagreements. Each time they were reminded about being kind. Many Kid Connections sessions could be taught on this topic.

In school, teachers were to post their classroom rules and consequences. In many classrooms, some form of the Golden Rule, "Do unto others as they would do unto you," was displayed. During the pandemic, many people became depressed and acted unkind to one another. Even though we are a loving and caring congregation, many of us also had complaints about each other. One of the most useful tools to instruct children is by example. Might a suggestion to everyone be to set a good example of kindness to each other. If the children see us being kind, they, too, will act kind. This means, not only in church should we act with kindness, but also at the grocery store, the doctor's office,

restaurants, fitness clubs, and all the various places we go during our busy days.

We can help parents teach their children how to be kind by setting a good example. Sit down with children and explain why people do some of these awful acts. Talk about how they can confide in an adult to talk about their concerns or a bully they encounter. We can be there for them instead of thinking about our woes. Let us put our children as our first priority.



**<u>Attention All</u> ~

The ABWM Regional Project this year is to help build a Food Pantry in the Dominican Republic for Haitian Immigrants in the area. BRIAN and LYNETTE SMITH serve among Haitians in partnership with Mission Maranatha Inc. working in the bateyes on the East Coast of the Dominican Republic. Brian works with local and visiting mission teams in construction and ongoing maintenance projects at existing ministries. Lynette is showing God's love to women and children through instruction in self-care skills and leading creative art workshops to empower them through creativity. Both Brian and Lynette work closely with colleagues in La Romana at the "Integral Vision Community Center" which aims to serve Haitian immigrants and cooperate with the Good Samaritan Hospital and local Haitian churches of the East of the Dominican Republic.

More than 30.5 percent of the population in the Dominican Republic lives below the poverty line. Widespread poverty, a lack of opportunities, and environmental issues such as water shortages, soil erosion, deforestation, flooding, and droughts are barriers to progress. Unemployment and underemployment are widespread.

The new food pantry that will be built is to be more secure than the present one and will be one that will keep out vermin and insects. This will allow the food to be stored more safely and let it last longer. The food pantry is greatly utilized by those Haitian immigrants in the region.

The ABWM usually send the proceeds from their sale of Chocolate Easter Eggs to this project. We were unable to make and sell Eggs again this year. If you usually purchase Easter Eggs from us and/or would like to contribute to this project, you can make a check out to ABWM of FBC and mark "Regional Project" in the memo section of the check. We appreciate any amount you could contribute. The Regional Goal (PA & DE) is \$15,000.00. We will accept contributions through the month of June. Thank you so much for your support.
